- <u>Author</u>: Apostle Paul
  - Date: c. AD 62-66
- <u>Theme</u>: Sound doctrine and godliness as best ministry approach against false teaching and apostasy.
- <u>Purpose</u>: To provide a guide for church organization to Timothy, young pastor of the church in Ephesus.

## First Introduction to Timothy

### - <u>Acts 16:1-3</u>

- His mother was Jewish and his father was Greek
- Timothy was circumcised, it appears out of a matter of expediency, so that his work among the Jewish might be more effective.
- Titus refused to be circumcised, as it appears that some were demanding circumcision for salvation.



### First Introduction to Timothy

### – Philippians 2:19-24

- Timothy was well spoken and it lead to a relationship of service (father/son type relationship between Paul and Timothy).
- Timothy had a "kindred spirit" and a genuine concern for the people's welfare.



### First Introduction to Timothy

#### - <u>Acts 17:13-14</u>

 Timothy and Silas remained with new congregations (Berea), when Paul had to quickly leave, due to Jewish persecution from Thessalonica.



### First Introduction to Timothy

### – <u>I Thessalonians 3:1-3</u>

 In Paul's absence, Timothy was an encouraging individual, that strengthened the faith of the Thessalonians congregation, even in distressing times.



### First Introduction to Timothy

- <u>II Corinthians 1:1; Philippians 1:1; Colossians 1:1; I</u> <u>Thessalonians 1:1 & II Thessalonians 1:1</u>
  - Timothy is mentioned in the salutation to many churches with Paul, as a fellow bond servant / slave of Jesus Christ.



### Timothy's Instruction

- Conduct himself / purity of leadership
- Administer the affairs of the church
- Counsel concerning his own spiritual progress



### Timothy's Instruction

- Explicit and complete instruction for church leadership and organization
- Appropriate conduct in worship gatherings
- Qualifications of Elders and Deacons
- Proper order of church discipline
