


Zechariah 13:7


 The temporary disengagement between Jesus and his disciples had begun. Most of them wouldn't see Jesus again until after his resurrection.




- Matthew 26:30-35, 51-59
 - Speculation: God's plan helped preserve the disciples from harm. Their fear of persecution led them to flee captivity. God didn't want them held behind bars yet, because these men were predestined to change the world with Jesus' gospel of peace. Their time had not yet come."

■ Matthew 26:69-70

 He watched as Jesus was interrogated in the middle of the night. Peter witnessed Jesus meekly refusing to defend himself. Jesus could have easily been released if a fair trial was conducted.



- Matthew 26:71-74
 - Perhaps Peter was consumed with despair, but he denies Jesus three times, within a very short amount of time.



■ Luke 22:61

- The word translated "looked at" is the Greek verb emblepo, which means: "to look at something directly and therefore intently."
- The word translated "wept" is the common Greek verb klaio: "to cry."
- Peter weeps intensely. The word "bitterly" is the Greek adverb pikros. The adjective pikros originally meant: "pointed, sharp," so the word carries the idea of sharpness, pain, severity."

Mark 14:30

 Speculation: Matthew, Luke and John state that Peter would deny Jesus 3 times before the roster crowed, while Mark 14:30 states that Peter would deny Jesus 3 times before the roster crowed twice, which indicates that Peter could have denied Jesus up to six times.

■ Luke 24:45

We can't justify their actions and we're not.
However, God used their fear to protect them
from the mobs. The disciples scattered, as
Zechariah said they would. They were now
safe - cowardly sinful - but safe and
preserved for their future mission.



■ II Corinthians 7:10
